



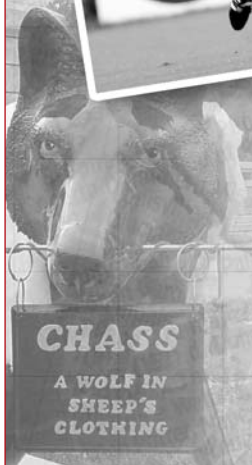

In an October reception at the North Carolina Museum of History, the College announced its 2003 Distinguished Alumna, Dr. Sandra Lee Harding (Ph.D. Sociology, 1994).

Harding is Dean of the Faculty of Business at the Queensland University of Technology (QUT) in Brisbane, Australia. She is an internationally recognized scholar on enterprise development and innovation and President of the Australian Council of Business Deans. She led the founding of an endowed Center for Philanthropy and Nonprofit Studies in Australia, and she is at the forefront in demonstrating that business schools can make substantial scholarly and applied research contributions to quality of life and social welfare.

“A NEW INSTITUTE FOR NONPROFITS IN CHASS”

I'm particularly pleased to be able to announce that CHASS is developing an Institute for Nonprofits to serve the entire university system as well as the nonprofit sector in North Carolina.



The first stage of the planning process has just been approved by President Molly Broad's office. So we're off and running. We have a new director on board, Barbara Metelsky, who has moved her family here from New Jersey to join NC State in this effort. She was previously connected with the nationally ranked nonprofit program at Seton Hall University, and she brings the right combination of skills and experience to lead us in building a nationally-ranked Institute here at NC State.

The new Institute will offer graduate education in nonprofit leadership as well as an undergraduate minor. In addition, applied research of particular interest to the nonprofit sector in North Carolina will be a specific focus. Growing from these two efforts, technical assistance and hands-on programs for nonprofit practitioners will be the third prong of our full-service program.

This new program is made possible through the leadership of Barbara Goodmon and a \$1 million challenge gift from the A.J. Fletcher Foundation in Raleigh. For CHASS, this opportunity to create something entirely new, central to the university system, and of service across the entire state is an especially exciting opportunity.

The Model Charters are designed to establish "the essential principles that must underlie successful municipal government."
